

RCC Horticulture Tour

There was "tooking" and "sprouting" going on at the Horticulture Tour at Richland Community College on Thursday, March 20th. The "tooking" noise was what Gomez the rooster did after he found food and let the hens know that there was food. Then Thing 1 and Thing 2 (black hens) and Zsa Zsa (short, white, fluffy hen) came running. The other hens are Rhode Island Reds and the oldest is called Dinosaur. We then went inside and saw how they candled and graded the eggs they got from the hens at the farm. The eggs are from small to jumbo and are kept cold so that they don't hatch. They wash the egg and shine a light on it to see the yolk movement. The smaller the air cell is at the top, the fresher the egg. Double A is the freshest. They sell the eggs for \$4.00 a dozen.

The "sprouting" was taking place in the greenhouses and being done by students planting clippings in the dirt. There is a germinator which is kept at 72 to 75 degrees so that the seeds can sprout in two days. They grow annuals, perennials, foliage, shrubs, hanging baskets, and have organic seed packets. They grow herbs from anise to thyme. They grow vegetables from bell peppers to heirloom tomatoes. They share these with the Culinary Department.

They will be having a plant sale on May 9th and 10th at RCC. They also have a Saturday Produce market from May 24-October 11 from 8:00 a.m. till 12:00 p.m. at RCC. Their motto is "From seed to market, you just can't get anything fresher".

The "Macon County Honor Guard" donation canister will be on the table again at the Spring Meeting. Please plan to donate to these great men who serve to honor so many veterans in our area. They make themselves available for any veteran's service no matter what the weather. They use their own money for all of their expenses and many of their guns are in need of expensive repair. Culinary Tour at Richland Community College

The Culinary Tour for the State Conference was at RCC on March 20, 2014. Ten people attended. Chef Tucker met us and told us that the Culinary Department started eight years ago. Each course is 8 weeks long. The students attend five hours at a time, either from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. or 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. The students also have other classes to attend. He showed us the three kitchens. The original one has bleachers and TV screens that are used for food demos. The demos are taped and can be reviewed again and again. The next kitchen was the bakery where they were making cookies. The newest kitchen was built a year and a half ago, and has more islands to work around. Chef Rogers made some apple tarts to eat. He used an anti-griddle that was 34 degrees. He put apple puree on the top and froze this. He put salted caramel powder in a plastic cup, and then added dehydrated red delicious apples and the frozen apple puree. He put some vanilla-flavored bubbles in the cup and those melted with the other ingredients. It tasted just like apple tarts!

MCHCE Culinary Tour

The tour on April 10th was for the MCHCE ladies. There were 30 ladies that listened to Chef Tucker. He told us that William Eichenauer had the idea of a Culinary Program. The program started in the fall of 2008. This program offers a two year Associates Degree. The student needs 67 credit hours and each class costs around \$600. Each class is sequential to the next class. Some of the examples of the classes are: famous chefs, vegetables, culinary math, soups, sauces, stocks and how to braise. The last class is a butchery class. They butcher a pig and make bacon, ham, sausage, etc. There are two elective courses. One is offered every other year and costs \$4,000. The students are taken on a fourteen hour plane ride to China! They spend 12 days going to different college kitchens and learn how to use other methods to prepare food. The other elective is taking a class through the Horticulture Department at RCC. The Culinary program at RCC takes 16 students every spring and fall. So far, since the fall of 2008, 60 students have graduated.





The March 12, 2014 lesson was on *Women and Coronary Heart Disease (CHD) by Dr. Kairouz*. There were 26 people in attendance. One in 3 women die of heart attaches, stroke or cardiovascular disease. Women ages 30-62 years old, according to a 50 year old Framington Heart Study, have a higher risk of death from CHD. Women are more likely to be misdiagnosed with their symptoms. They experience symptoms differently such as back discomfort, jaw and abdominal pain, shortness of breath, nausea, and psychological stress. The risk factors are: family history, obesity, postmenopausal, deep vein disease, smoking, kidney disease, high blood pressure (HBP), abnormal

cholesterol, diabetes mellitus and metabolic syndrome (smoke, HBP, and a big waist.) Lifestyle changes would be a healthy diet (1600 to 2000 calories a day), weight management, physical exercise (30 minutes for 5 to 7 days a week), and HDL more than 50, and triglycerides less than 150. Keep your ticker in tiptop shape!!!

The State HCE Convention remains the highlight of each years' meetings and activities. Nearly 400 RSVP's were made for the March 18-20 conference that was held at the Decatur Conference Center. Many hands and hours made goodies for stuffing the goodie bag hand-outs to welcome the guests. Following the morning program speakers, the cast of the Macon County HCE actors presented the skit "Been Cookin' 90 Years". A 90th birthday celebration is planned for 2014. We also learned that the original kitchen is used by the Heartland Culinary students. The bakery bakes all of the cookies, sconces, and other pastries for the RCC Coffee House. These students are sent to St. Louis for barista training for the Coffee House. The newest kitchen is state of the art! As we were walking through, the students were figuring out the differences in cheeses and smoking beef jerky. Some of the appliances beside the anti-griddle (freeze) were an oven steamer (good for bread), and a sous verde, in which you can vacuum-seal and cook at a constant temperature food, such at 48 hour ribs!

There is a new section being built which will be a restaurant to be opened in August 2014. It will be open for lunch and dinner every Tuesday and Thursday. It will seat 50 people. The students will learn to cook, wait on people, clean up, and manage a restaurant. Mayo Clinic Aspirin

Dr. Virend Somers, is a Cardiologist from the Mayo Clinic, who is lead author of the report in the July 29, 2008 issue of the Journal of the American College of Cardiology.

Most heart attacks occur in the day, generally between 6 a.m. and noon. Having one during the night, when the heart should be most at rest, means that something unusual happened. Somers and his colleagues have been working for a decade to show that sleep apnea is to blame.

1. If you take an aspirin or a baby aspirin once a day, take it at night. The reason: Aspirin has 24-hour "half-life": therefore, if most heart attacks happen in the wee hours

- of the morning, the Aspirin would be strongest in your system.
- 2. FYI, Aspirin lasts a really long time in your medicine chest for years. (When it gets old, it smells like vinegar.)

Something that we can do to help ourselves—nice to know. Bayer is making crystal aspirin to dissolve instantly on the tongue. They work much faster than the tablets.

Why keep Aspirin by your bedside? It's about Heart Attacks. There are other symptoms of a heart attack, besides the pain on the arm. One must also be aware of an intense pain on the chin, as well as nausea and lots of sweating; however, these symptoms may also occur less frequently. Note: There may be NO pain in the chest during a heart attack.

The majority of people (about 60%) who had a heart attack during their sleep did not wake up. However, if it occurs, the chest pain may wake you up from your deep sleep. If it happens, immediately dissolve two aspirins in your mouth and swallow them with a bit of water. Afterwards: Call 911. Phone a neighbor or a family member who lives very close by. Say "Heart Attack!," say that you have taken 2 aspirins, take a seat on a chair by the front door, and wait for their arrival and DO NOT LIE DOWN!
