The shape of Illinois is defined by the Wabash, Ohio and Mississippi Rivers. Illinois has more miles of the Mississippi River than any other state.

Overnight French Toast

1 pound bread (King's Hawaiian is great in this) 1 cup sugar 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon 8 large eggs 2 cups heavy cream



Tear the bread into 1-inch pieces and put in a large bowl (you will have about 9 cups of bread).

In a small bowl, mix together the sugar and cinnamon.

In another large bowl, whisk together the eggs, cream, and $\frac{3}{4}$ cup of the cinnamon sugar, then pour over the bread stirring until coated.

At this point, cover and refrigerate for at least 2 hours or overnight.

Preheat the oven to 350° F. Coat a 13 X 9-inch baking dish with nonstick cooking spray. Spread the batter in the prepared dish and sprinkle the top with the remaining cinnamon sugar. Bake until puffed and golden brown, 35 to 40 minutes.

Remove from the oven and serve with warm maple syrup or powdered sugar.

Strawberry Pretzel Salad



6 ½ ounces pretzel sticks (2 cups crushed) ¾ cup granulated sugar

12 Tablespoons (3/4 cup) butter, melted and cooled

8-ounces cream cheese

- 1 cup heavy cream
- 2 3 oz. packages strawberry Jell-O dissolved in 2 cups hot water
- 1 -16 oz. carton frozen un-drained and un-thawed strawberries
- 1 8 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained.

Adjust oven rack to middle position and heat oven to 400° degrees. Spray 13 by 9-inch baking pan with vegetable oil spray. Pulse pretzels and ¼ cup sugar in food processor until coarsely ground, about 15 pulses. Add melted butter and pulse until combined, about 10 pulses. Transfer pretzel mixture to prepared pan. Using bottom of measuring cup, press crumbs into bottom of pan. Bake about 10 minutes. Set aside to cool, about 20 minutes.

Using stand mixer fitted with whisk, whip cream cheese and $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar on medium speed until light and fluffy, about 2 minutes. Increase speed to medium-high and with mixer still

running, slowly add cream in a steady stream. Continue to whip until soft peaks form, scraping down bowl as needed, about one minute more. Spread whipped cream cheese mixture evenly over cooled crust. Refrigerate until set, about 30 minutes.

Mix together 2 3 oz. packages strawberry Jell-O dissolved in 2 cups hot water, 1 16 oz. carton frozen un-drained and unthawed strawberries, 1 8 oz. can crushed pineapple, drained. When this is partially set, pour over cream cheese layer. Refrigerate at least 4 hours or up to 24 hours.
