All of the ladies had a great time at the Garden Path for our June Lesson. Rick Starshak did a wonderful job giving us information on Backyard Landscape. One of the points he made was "Good Vision Makes Good Design". He suggested coming up with 3 reasons why you like a design before you use it. When you plant, be careful not to place the plants to close to prevent overcrowding when the plants spread out. Many questions were answered and everyone enjoyed walking around the beautiful gardens. Rick had two hand-outs available for us to take with us.

The Top 10 Landscape Design Principles are:

Vision/Theme

1.Determine the purpose and various areas of the landscape. 2.Envision the entire landscape, and its parts, as it will look when completed.

Arrangement

3.Lay out borders (Create Space).

4.Select a focal point (Create Impact).

5.Add balance (Create Stability).

Selection

- 6. Generate interest.
- 7. Add harmony.
- 8. Use contrast.
- 9. Start big and end small.
- 10. Numbers matter.

Planting Guidelines:

Basic Guidelines

1.Dig when soil is dry, not wet. Soil should loosely crumble in your hand.

2. The hole should be a minimum of 2-3 times as wide as the root ball, but no deeper.

3. Place soil in a pile or wheelbarrow. Mix in an

"amendment" (compost, peat, or loose, rich topsoil) about 1 part amendment to 2 parts soil.

4. Loosen or scrape the roots to loose pot-bound roots and stimulate plant growth.

5. Place the plant in the hole at the same depth as it was in the pot (about the same height as the pot).

6.Replace soil mixture and "firm" into the hole; leave a circle of "raised" soil around the plant to catch water.

7.Fertilize if desired.

8. Mulch 2-3 inches deep around the plant and mounded up soil.

9. Water immediately.

10. If you planted a tree, stake it loosely for 1-2 years.

Watering

1. Water new plantings every 2-3 days for a week or two, depending on the temperature and conditions.

2. Reduce watering over next 2-3 months, toward a goal of about 1 inch per week. When you water, water thoroughly and deeply letting the soil dry out completely. Do not water every day. Overwatering is the number one killer of plants.

3. A well-amended and well-mulched plant should need little or no additional watering after it becomes established... about 3 months for perennials and about a year for trees and shrubs.

I delivered your generous contributions last week. Each agency was thrilled to receive our donations. Ronald McDonald House accepted 62 pillowcases that we made as well as 33 pounds of pop tabs. We continue to collect both. Macon Resources received 3 paper boxes that normally hold 12 reams of paper each filled with used card fronts as well as new cards with envelopes. At this time, they are not accepting more card fronts. I will let you know when we can collect again. If you wish to save them, please hold onto them until I get the word from Macon Resources, as I have no place to store them.

The Child 1st Center received \$57.00, 12 rolls of paper towels, 8 juice boxes, 18 granola bars, 8 snack size packages of peanut butter crackers, 20 individual bags of assorted chips, 76 ounces of detergent, 1 box of tissues, and 75 sanitary wipes. During this delivery, I was able to see the new facility at 800 E. Clay in Decatur. It is a very nice facility. I was very proud to make these deliveries on your behalf.

My other task as a board member is to keep track of your volunteer hours. I was very proud to accept an award on your behalf at the state conference. In our county, 73% of our members turned in volunteer hours. That was the highest percentage in the state.
