- and peanut butter snacks, 20 bags of chips, 76 oz. of detergent, 1 box of Kleenex, and 75 sanitizing wipes.
- Collected and participated in the proper disposal of 29 American Flags

- Twenty of us taught students of all ages how to sew a button at the Maker Faire.

JANUARY MINUTES

Bylaw changes to be voted on at Spring meeting: May 3, 2017

ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Qualifications

Sustaining – a member who may want to participate in county activities and programs, but does not wish to belong to a unit. The fee for this membership is \$15.00.

Change: Sustaining to Member-at-Large (this is how IAHCE has it)

ARTICLE II - MCAHCE BOARD

Section 2. Terms of Office for Officers

The officers of this Association shall be elected at the Annual Fall Meeting for a period of two years – the First Vice-President, Second Vice-President and Secretary shall be elected in the odd years and the President and Treasurer in the even years. They shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. No elective officer may serve more than two terms in the same office, nor more than four successive years on the board. Exception – The Office of President may serve for six successive years on the board if the term of President starts in the fifth year.

Add - After leaving the board they must be off the board for a minimum of six months before returning to any board position.

ARTICLE II - MCAHCE BOARD

Section 3. Terms of Office for Directors.

At least three (3) directors shall be elected at the Annual Fall Meeting in the even years (Community Outreach, Cultural Enrichment, Family Issues) and the remaining directors in the odd years (Public Relations, Historian, International) and shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. No director shall serve more than two terms in the same position, nor more than four successive years on the Board.

Change: Community Outreach and Family Issues to Family and Community Issues (per IAHCE change)

Add: After leaving the board they must be off the board for a minimum of six months before returning to any board position.

Add:

ARTICLE II - MCAHCE BOARD

Section 8. Vacancies.

In the event of a vacancy in the office of

A. President - The First Vice President shall succeed to the office.

Other Officers and Directors – The Board shall, within 60 days appoint a qualified member of HCE to fill the unexpired term of the respective office.

ARTICLE IV - DUTIES OF OFFICERS OF BOARD

Section 5. Treasurer

The Treasurer shall have charge of all funds of this Association, and deposit said funds to the account of the MCAHCE in such bank as may be designated by the MCAHCE Board. The Treasurer shall keep a complete record of funds received and of deposits made in said bank. The Treasurer shall pay them out only on order of the MCAHCE Board and make a treasurer's report at the MCAHCE Board meetings and then place on file in the county office. The Treasurer shall make such other reports as the Board may direct. The Treasurer shall submit records for audit at the end of the Association year and at other times as directed by the MCAHCE Board.

Add: Two signatures are required, preferably the President and Treasurer, for expenses exceeding \$300.00.



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
