Baked Ham with Cherry Maple Glaze

1 bone-in, spiral sliced smoked ham (8 to 10 lbs)

Simmer:

2 jars cherry preserves (12 oz each)

1 cup pure maple syrup

6 tablespoons Amaretto

1/4 cup Dijon mustard

Combine 3 cups cherry juice and 1 stick of cinnamon Bring ham to room temperature, about 2 hours. Simmer cherry preserves, maple syrup, amaretto, and Dijon in a small saucepan over medium-low heat. Reduce until syrupy, about 25 minutes. Preheat oven to 300° with the oven rack in the bottom third of the oven. Combine the cherry juice and cinnamon in a roasting pan. Place ham, cut side down, on a rack set inside the roasting pan. Brush 1/2 cup glaze, return to the oven, uncovered, and continue roasting until the glaze is set. 20 to 30 minutes more.

Transfer ham to a cutting board. Loosely ten with foil and let rest for 15 minutes. Serve the ham with the remaining glaze. To ensure the ham doesn't turn out dry, be sure to let it come to room temperature before baking. Place it on a rack set inside a pan filled with cherry juice, then tightly seal with foil, to create the steam that steams the ham whole keeping it moist.

Cherry Coffee Cake

1 1/2 stick margarine

1 3/4 cup sugar

2 1/2 cup flour

1/2 tsp salt

1 tsp vanilla

4 eggs

1/2 tsp baking powder

1 can cherry pie filling

Melt margarine, add the vanilla. Set aside. Mix sugar and eggs, one egg at a time. Add flour, baking powder and salt. Grease 9 x 13 inch baking dish and flour or spray with Pam. Spoon the batter and top

with pie filler. Pour melted butter-vanilla mixture over the top of the batter and swirl. Bake at 350° for 45 to 50 minutes

Cherry Orange Chicken

40 oz chicken tenderloins 20 ox maraschino cherries, reserving 3/4 cherries

1 cup orange juice, concentrate

1 teaspoon salt

1/2 tsp pepper

2 tablespoon vegetable oil

Roll the chicken in the crumb mix. Brown chicken in oil. Place the cherries and the orange juice in the blender. Blend until smooth. Place in the pan and heat. Thicken with 1 tablespoon of cornstarch in 1/2 cup water. Put the browned chicken in a 13" x 9 " ungreased baking dish. Pour orange/cherry mixture over the chicken. Put in a 325° oven. Uncover and cook for 30 minutes. Enjoy!!

Slow Cooked Cherry Pork Chops

6 bone-in pork loin chops (8 ounces each)

1/4 t. Salt

Dash of pepper

1 can of canned cherry pie filling

2 t. Lemon juice

½ t. Chicken bouillon granules

1/2 t. Mace or nutmeg

1/2 t. Additional cherry pie filling warmed, optional

In a large skillet coated with cooking spray, brown the pork chops over medium heat on both sides. Season with salt and pepper.

In a 3 quart slow cooker, combine the pie filling, lemon juice, bouillon and mace or nutmeg. Add the chops. Cover and cook on low for 3 to 4 hours or until the meat is no longer pink. Serve with additional pie filling, if desired.
