<u>Upcoming Class Information!</u> <u>Creative Ideas for Sewing Your Scraps</u>

Mary Ann Platt and Cheryl Samples

I am so sorry that we had to cancel the class on July 21. I had some health issues and a death in my family to deal with. We are going to have this class on September 18 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. From 9 to 11 will be the string piecing quilt technique, from 11 to 12 will be a class about jelly roll quilting, and from 1 to 4 will be crumb block quilting. We will have a salad luncheon and if you want to contribute ingredients, that would be great.

Cheryl Samples has agreed to help so we can accommodate up to 35 students in the Clover Room on September 18. Have you ever felt bad about throwing away small strips of fabric? I have, but I don't anymore. From 9 to 11, you will learn one of my favorite ways of using scraps. I have made and donated several quilts using the string piecing technique. Many quilters use this technique. We will sew fabric strips onto a paper foundation. Strips will vary in width, but some will be very narrow. You will have the choice of using strips in the same color family or using a variety of colors. I would like to end this class at 11. After that, Cheryl will be presenting a class on using jellyrolls for quilting. There will be a one-hour break for lunch. You can sign up for either or all of the classes.

At 1 o'clock, you will learn another favorite technique that I like to use, making crumb blocks. We will be sewing small scraps together to make our own "fabric". Once you have made a big enough piece of fabric, we will square it up to a predetermined size and make more blocks. Again, this is FUN. Some people think that I am a bit crazy when I ask for their scraps. I like to make these totally scrappy with many colors.

You will need to bring a sewing machine in good working order that you know how to use. You will also need neutral thread, a quarter inch foot for your machine, scissors, paper for notes and pins or clips. Bring these items too, if you have them: a small, low voltage iron, a rotary cutter, a small cutting mat, a wool pressing mat, and a ruler for cutting. I have ALL the scrap fabric that we will need, so you don't have to bring fabric.

We hope to see you there. We know that it will be a great, fun day!! Call the Extension Office at 217-877-6042 as soon as possible since we have a limit of 35.

Homemade Peach Pie Filling

Author: The Kitchen Whisperer Yield: 2 quarts or 7 quarts Q

Ingredients

FOR 2 QUARTS OF FILLING

7 cups sliced peaches2 cup sugar

1/2 cup ClearJel plus 2 tbl

1/2 cups cold water or peach juice 1/4 tsp cinnamon

1/2 cup lemon juice

qtjars/lids/rings

FOR 7 QUARTS OF FILLING

6 qts of sliced peaches (about 7-8 pounds of peaches) 7 cups sugar

2 cups ClearJel plus 3 tbl

5 1/4 cups cold water or peach juice 1 tsp cinnamon

1 3/4 cup lemon juice 7 qt jars/lids rings

Plus an additional 1/4 cup lemon juice or Fruit-Fresh pectin

Instructions

- 1. Make an 'X' in the bottom of each peach.
- 2. Place into boiling water for 30-60 seconds
- 3. Remove and place into ice cold water
- 4. Remove skins
- 5. Cut up the peaches
- 6. To keep from turning brown mix in 1/4 cup lemon juice or Fruit-Fresh pectin. Stir to coat.
- 7. Combine the water, sugar, ClearJel and cinnamon in large pot.
- 8. Stir and cook over medium high heat until the mixture thickens and begins to bubble.
- 9. Add the lemon juice and boil the sauce for 1 minute more, stirring constantly.
- 10. Add in the drained peach slices and cook for 3 minutes.
- 11. Fill the jars within ¾"-1" from the top.
- 12. Put the filled jars in the canner and keep them covered with at least 1" of water.
- 13. Boil for 30 minutes.

Notes

ClearJel is not the same as SureJel - read THIS article that explains the difference and what will happen when you try to substitute one for the other. My local stores do not carry ClearJel so I order it off of Amazon.

Orange Slice Cake

2 cups chopped pecans

1 cup butter
4 eggs
1 1/4 c. milk
1 tsp. Baking soda
3 c. flour

Mix all the ingredients together and pour into a greased angel food cake pan and bake at 250 degrees for about 2 hours.


