Medical Identity Theft Karen Halicki

Reminder!!! We watched a web program at go.illinois.edu/Medical Theft at the Extension Office. You can go to the website if you would like to hear it. I have listed some of the highlights from this program.

- Understand what medical theft is and how it works.
- Learn about resources and what to do if it happens to you.
- They will steal, trick you, take your wallet, pretend to help you and use a data breach to gain access to your information.
- It can affect your medical and health insurance records. By someone else using your information, they can show a different blood type, inaccurate history, illnesses, injury, allergy or a condition that you do not have.
 - Get copies of your medical records and check them.
 - If you lose your health insurance card, call and ask for a new ID number and a new card.
- Shred papers with your medical identity before putting them in the trash or recycle bin.
 - Remove or destroy the labels on your prescription bottles and packages.
 - Never share health data or health information over the phone, email, website, or apps.
- Report your identity theft to the Federal Trade Commission at <u>www.identity</u>theft.gov.
 - Receive medical specialty reports at <u>www.MIB.com</u>.
 - Senior Medical Patrol at <u>www.smpresources.org</u>

Delicious Recipes

With the start of a new year, I thought that I would give you some "comfort food" recipes. Several members have contributed recipes for you all to enjoy. Linda

Peanut Butter Fudge- Bonnie Lanham

1 16 oz jar of peanut butter

1 16 oz can of regular frosting (not whipped or cream cheese)

Mix these ingredients together and microwave 1 minute, stir, and then microwave 1 more minute.

Add chopped pecans or walnuts. Pour into a sprayed 9 x 9 inch pan. Refrigerate until set. Cut and serve.

Chocolate Chip Cheese Ball—Mary Ann Platt

8 oz. cream cheese, softened

1 stick butter, softened

Beat these two ingredients until smooth.

Stir in:

¾ c. powdered sugar

2 Tbsp. packed brown sugar

¼ tsp. vanilla

Add and stir in ¾ c. mini chocolate chips. Cover and refrigerate for 2 hours. Form the mixture into a ball. Wrap in plastic wrap and refrigerate for 1 hour. Roll the ball in ¾ c. of finely chopped pecans. Serve with graham crackers.

Raspberry Green Tomato Jam—Lyn Stevens

2 ½ cups puréed green tomatoes (about 3 medium)

2 cups sugar

1 package(3 ounces) raspberry jello

In a large saucepan, bring tomatoes and sugar to a boil. Reduce the heat and simmer uncovered for 20 minutes. Remove from the heat; stir in gelatin until dissolved. Skim off any foam. Pour into jars or containers, leaving ½ inch headspace. Cool before covering with lids. Refrigerate up to 3 weeks.

Hawaiian Ham and Cheese Sliders- Mary Ann Platt

Needed equipment-9 x 13 baking dish, pastry brush

Ingredients

¾ cup butter, melted

1 tbsp Dijon mustard (I used regular mustard)

1 tsp Worcestershire sauce

1 tsp brown sugar

1 tbsp poppy seeds (I left this out)

2 tsp dried minced onions

12 King's Hawaiian rolls (1 package)

9 oz deli ham, sliced thin

8 oz Swiss cheese, sliced thin (I used American cheese)

Preheat the oven to 350. Spray a 9 x 13 inch baking dish with non-stick or butter the dish. Combine butter, mustard, Worcestershire sauce, brown sugar, poppy seeds, and dried onion in a separate bowl. Slice the rolls to make sandwiches. Remove tops and set aside. Place the bottom pieces into the prepared baking dish. Layer the ham onto the rolls. Top the ham with the Swiss Cheese. Put the tops of the rolls onto the sandwiches. Brush or pour the liquid mixture evenly over the rolls. Bake for 20 minutes or until the rolls are lightly browned and the cheese has melted. You can separate the individual sandwiches to serve. Enjoy!

Lemon Brownies with Lemon Glaze–Mary Ann Platt

Since our country of study this year is Italy, I thought that I would publish this recipe that uses lemons, a favorite fruit of Italy. These are delicious! Linda

<u>Brownies</u>

1 15.25 oz box of yellow cake mix (I used Betty Crocker)

1 box of lemon instant pudding

⅓ c. of lemon juice

2 large eggs

1 tsp of lemon zest

Glaze

1 cup powdered sugar

1 tbsp of lemon juice (add a few extra drops if needed for desired consistency)

Lemon zest for garnishing (optional)

Line an 8 inch square baking dish with parchment paper and spray with cooking spray so that the brownies lift out easily. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. With a hand mixer, mix the cake mix, pudding, lemon juice, eggs and lemon zest in a medium sized mixing bowl. Pour the batter into the prepared pan and spread evenly. Bake for 22-24 minutes (1 baked for 4 or 5 minutes more) or until the toothpick can be inserted in the center and comes out clean or with only crumbs (no wet batter). Remove from the oven and let cool in the pan for about 10 minutes. Lift the parchment paper out of the pan and cool thoroughly. Cut brownies into squares and make the glaze.

For the glaze, combine the powdered sugar and lemon juice together until smooth. Drizzle the glaze over the brownies and sprinkle with lemon zest. ENJOY!

Lesson–Tuesday, November 9, "Lincoln in Illinois–The Early Years"

Don Chamberlain has done many programs for HCE. He was a high school teacher and when he retired, he started taking pictures and touring the country. Check out his website: wwwdecphotography.com and see some of his beautiful pictures. His presentation on November 9th was about Abraham Lincoln from around 1830 to 1837. Lincoln arrived in Decatur in 1830 with his family and worked in farming and built fences. He made his first political speech at the town square. He survived the winter of the Big Snow, headed to New Salem while his family decided to go back to Indiana. The family ended up staying around Charleston after a friend talked his father into staying there. In 1832, Lincoln ran for Illinois State legislator for the first time and lost the election.

In 1833, he was appointed Postmaster of New Salem and also became a deputy surveyor in towns such as Petersburg, Athens, and Albany. In 1834, he ran for the state legislature for a second time and won. While traveling, he would borrow books and study while he was on horseback. In 1836, he was elected for the third time for the legislature and also applied for a license to practice law. In December of that year, he joined the "Long Nine" (legislatures from the Springfield area) who sought to move the state capitol from Vandalia to Springfield. In 1837, he was granted a Certificate of Admission to the Illinois Bar. He went back to New Salem for a while, but then decided to build a career in law in Springfield.

Lesson–Tuesday, November 9th, 2021 "The Latest Trends in Home Decor"

Peggy Phipps is from Grand Design by Peggy. She started talking about how she decided to go to design school when her daughter was in high school. At one time, she had 8 employees and about 5 years ago, she was down to one employee and decided to do her business out of her home.

When you start working on a room, Peggy suggested that you start with the flooring. For paint colors, don't forget to look at the woodwork when working with colors of paint. She suggested that you pick the paint last. It is cheaper to repaint, and sometimes shadowing can change the way a wall looks. Wallpaper has come a long way. There is no more messy paste, just peel and stick. It will release so that you can move it around. Peggy also talked about window dressing, showing us many different kinds of shades. One that stood out was a Duette Honeycomb shade. The construction creates air pockets where the light meets color. You can raise and lower from the top or bottom to suit the day and your activities. She likes to work with Pyramid in Effingham, Illinois, for granite in the kitchen.

Peggy likes to meet in your home so she can see what you are working on. Her first hour is free and sometimes people just want to be consulted about doing any changes. Someone asked her about how long she will be working in her business and she said she is in her early 70's and as long as she enjoys her job, she will keep going! She gave us a very interesting lesson.
