Great Recipes

Hash brown Breakfast Casserole—served at the Tri-County breakfast by Helen Kershaw

20 ounces shredded hash browns, thawed

1 pound sausage cooked, crumbled and drained

1/4 c. onion, finely diced

1/2 red bell pepper, diced

1/2 green bell pepper, diced

8 eggs

1 can evaporated milk, 12 ounces or 1 1/3 c. milk

1/2 tsp. Italian seasoning or your favorite herbs/spices

Salt and pepper to taste

2 c. cheddar cheese

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Brown sausage and drain fat. Combine eggs, evaporated milk, salt and pepper, and Italian seasoning in a bowl. Whisk until smooth. Set aside 1/2 c. cheese for the topping. Place the remaining ingredients in a 9 x 13 inch baking pan. Pour egg mixture over the mixture and top with the remaining cheese. Cover and refrigerate overnight, if desired. If refrigerated overnight, remove from the refrigerator 30 minutes before baking. It may require an extra 10 to 15 minutes baking time. Bake 55 to 65 minutes or until cooked through.

Zinger Cake -- by Helen Kershaw

Bake a white cake mix in a 9 by 13 inch pan. Mix 1 cup boiling water and 1 3 ounce package of raspberry jello. Poke holes in the cake. Put the jello in the holes, then spread raspberry jam on top of the cake. Chill. Remove and add a container of Cool Whip to the top of the cake. Sprinkle coconut on top. Now you have a Zinger cake!!!

Tropical Trail Mix—Ann Bandy, Center Unit

- 1. 7 ounce package of chopped, dried tropical fruit
- 2. 2 cups popped low-fat kettle flavored popcorn
- 3. 3 cups high protein and high fiber cereal
- 4. 1/2 c. cinnamon-brown sugar roasted almonds
- 5. 1 c. fish-shaped pretzels

Combine all of the ingredients in a large bowl. This will make 16 servings, 1/2 cup a serving.

Crustless Pumpkin Pie--Georgette Merrifield

3/4 c. Splenda

1/2 c. light Bisquick

12 oz. can evaporated skim milk

1/2 c. Egg Beaters (egg substitute or 3 egg whites)

16 oz. can pumpkin

1 1/2 tsp. vanilla

Crust:

1 1/2 tsp. pumpkin pie spice

Mix all thoroughly. Spray 9 inch pie pan. Pour into the pan. Cook 1 hour at 350 degrees. Let cool. Cut into 8 pieces.

Rhubarb Dream Bars—Cathy Gipson / Yields 16 bars.

1 c. flour2 large eggs1/2 c. sugar1 c. sugar1/2 c. butter1/4 tsp. saltInstructions:2 c. fresh, diced rhubarb. (She used frozen, and drained it with paper towels)

Preheat oven to 350. Line the bottom of the 8 by 8 inch with parchment paper bringing up the sides so that it will easy to remove the squares. Whirl the crust ingredients in a food processor and then press into the prepared pan. Bake for 15 minutes. Crust will still be pale in color. While the crust is baking, mix together the eggs, sugar, flour, salt and whisk well. Stir in the rhubarb. Pour over the hot crust and continue to bake for 40 to 45 minutes. Let the bars cool and remove with the parchment paper. Cut into squares. Double the recipe for a bar pan size.

Filling:

Cheesy Chicken and Rice Casserole—Lois Miller

1/4 tsp. black pepper

1 can (10 3/4 oz.). Campbell's cream of chicken soup

2 c. frozen mixed vegetables

4 skinless, boneless chicken breasts

1 1/3 c. water

3/4 c. long grain white rice

1/2 c. shredded cheese

1/2 tsp. onion powder

Stir soup, water, rice, onion powder, black pepper and vegetables in 11 by 18 inch (2 qt.) shallow baking pan. Top with chicken. Season chicken as desired. Cover and bake at 375 for 50 minutes or until chicken and rice are done. Top with cheese. Let casserole stand. Stir rice before serving.
