Gluten Intolerance and other Food Allergies—Emily McDowell, our State Public Relations Director, presenter. She is not a doctor, but she was diagnosed with gluten intolerance in 2022. She gave some good ideas that she has learned along the way. It takes 3 to 5 months for your body to rid itself of gluten and for the body to start to heal itself.

Have you ever wondered why Southern Illinois is called Little Egypt? The most popular theory and one that makes sense is that the title began in the 1830's when there was a cold winter, a late spring and an early frost. It was a hard year for Northern Illinois. Many people headed south to buy corn, grain and other farming products. Northerners likened themselves to the children of Jacob, who in famine times headed south to Egypt during biblical times. The southern region became known as "Little Egypt", as documented in a Judge Andrew Duff story.

Another theory is that the land between the Mississippi and Ohio river valleys were similar to Egypt's Nile Delta. When two developers bought land in this valley in 1818, they called it Cairo. Goshen, Karnak, Carmi, Thebes, and Dongola are also Egyptian names.

### <u>Recipe</u>

Many people have requested Cathy Gipson's minestrone soup recipe!

So here it is! Happy eating!!!

#### QUICK MINESTRONE SOUP

- 1 c. Carrots, thinly sliced
- 1 small zucchini, sliced
- 1/2 c. Onion, chopped
- 1/2 c. Sliced celery
- 2 cans (14 1/2 oz each) chicken broth
- 2 c. Water
- 1 can (15 1\2 oz) dark red kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 cup medium shell pasta, uncooked
- 1 c. Frozen Italian style green beans
- 1 tsp. Each dried oregano leaves and dried basil leaves
- 2 oz.(1/2 c.) Parmesan cheese, grated

Thinly slice carrots and zucchini. Cut each zucchini slice in half. Cathy sautés the vegetables in olive oil first. Put all the ingredients, except the cheese, into a Dutch oven pan. Bring to a boil, then reduce the heat. Cover and simmer for 20 to 25 minutes or until the vegetables are crisp tender. Grate the cheese and sprinkle over each serving.

Yield is 6 servings.
