YUMMY RECIPES!!

** At the Christmas lesson today with Gini Smith, Karen Cahill brought cookies and several people asked for this recipe, so here it is!!!

Cathy's Brownie Cookies 1 box of Aldi's brownie mix 1/2 c. Canola oil 1 egg and 1 yolk 1 T. Water

About 3/4 c. Milk chocolate and/or butterscotch chips combined (more or less according to your taste or any other kind of chip you like)

Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Mix the ingredients together. She uses a big cookie scoop but doesn't fill it all the way up. She also uses parchment paper on her cookie trays. These cookies will spread out so leave lots of room between them. Bake for 8 minutes. Slide the parchment paper off of the cookie sheet and set the paper and cookies on a rack to cool. The cookies will still look "damp" or gooey in the middle, but they will firm up as they cool. These are chewy cookies. If you like yours more crisp, bake them longer.

Cathy has used other brownie mixes, but depending on the brand, you may not have to add the egg yolk or the 1T. of water. It depends on how stiff the batter is.

**I am on a gluten free diet, so when I find a banana bread that is moist and Bill likes it too, it's a keeper!! Here is my favorite gluten free banana bread recipe. ENJOY!!

Gluten Free Moist Banana Bread

2 cups of gluten free flour. I have used Bob's Red Mill gluten free flour or Walmart brand gluten free flour. I like both.

4-5 very ripe bananas (mashed 1 1/2 cups)	1/2 c. sugar
1/2 c. butter, softened	2 eggs
2 tbs. milk	1/2 tsp. vanilla
1 tsp. baking powder	1 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt	

1/2-1 cup chocolate chips, or dried cranberries, or raisins. We like raisins the best!!

Preheat your oven to 350. Lightly grease a loaf pan. In a big bowl, combine the flour, baking soda, baking powder and salt. Put aside. In another bowl, cream together the sugar and butter. Stir in the milk, eggs, vanilla and mashed bananas until well blended. Stir the banana mixture and the chocolate chips or dried cranberries or raisins until it is just moistened. Pour the mixture into the loaf pan.

Bake in the preheated oven for 50 to 55 minutes until a toothpick or knife comes out clean. Let it cool for about 15 minutes then put it on a wire rack to finish cooling. It is most delicious when it is still warm!!!!

Tickets for \$5 will be sold until the fall meeting, with the proceeds benefiting the scholarship fund. **1st Vice President:** Sandy Severe reminded all present of upcoming events.

2nd Vice President: Lyn Stevens reported that there are 116 Macon County HCE members. Bookmarks have been delivered to all Macon County libraries. Lyn gave a copy of the Homemakers' Aim to six new 2022 members. Community/Family Issues: Linda Hooge reminded attendees that the next pillowcase sewing day will be on June 26. Fabric donations are welcome.

Cultural Enrichment: Cheryl Sample encouraged us to learn a new craft and to attend fairs to check out 4-H entries and get some ideas from them. Cultural Enrichment Day on November 29 will be open to the community.

Historian: Carol Ropp encouraged units to give her pictures of unit meetings, etc., especially from Christian County. Regarding scholarships, Carol pointed out that applications are on line at mchce.org. and are due by July 3. There are four \$500 scholarships available. She noted that these are for tuition not only at four-year colleges, but junior colleges and trade schools as well, and can be used at colleges in Illinois and out of state. In addition, there are two \$1,000 (medical only) Margaret Leonard scholarships.

International: Vicky Wooten and Lois Miller noted that Egypt is our country of study for this year's International Day in September, with Piatt County in charge. Look for articles in upcoming newsletters.

Public Relations: Linda Austin reported that June 12 is the next newsletter deadline. Linda likes to include recipes, clean jokes, book reviews and unit news.

CVH Awards: Karen Cahill reported 19,142 volunteer hours for 2022, which won Macon County the state award for most volunteer hours! Twenty-five CVH awards were presented, with Cathy Gipson volunteering 1,650 hours! Since only 63% of our membership reported hours, Karen encouraged us to do better this year, along with the reminder to round up partial hours and to separately designate time spent between HCE and Other. According to the government, one hour of volunteer service equals a \$29.95 value, which makes our Macon County HCE hours worth \$573,302.90. The value effective April 2023 is \$31.80/hour. Georgette Merrifield further explained the significance of volunteer hours.

Mt. Zion earned the gavel for highest percentage of members present, and Maple Grove received the bell for most members. Mary Kay Ellis presented a beautiful and moving memorial ceremony for six of our members who have passed since last spring. A music box played "That's What Friends Are For."
