

Karen Cahill sent me a list of mental health books that she came across. She thought that many of them sounded very interesting.

1. Maybe You Should Talk to Someone by Lori Gottlieb (2019)

A therapist writes a memoir about challenging times personally (when SHE needs a therapist). Rated a top-notch book.

2. Hidden Valley Road by Robert Kolker (2020).

This is a true story about a family from Colorado Springs who had six of their 12 children diagnosed with schizophrenia.

3. Why Has Nobody Told Me This Before by Julie Smith (2022)

A clinical psychologist gives practical solutions for coping with everyday challenges such as anxiety, depression, grief, stress, etc. Each chapter covers a different issue.

4. From Strength to Strength by Arthur Brooks (2022)

This is considered a great mental health book for learning how to refocus priorities to feel useful and satisfied in the later stages of life.

5. Broken (in the Best Possible Way) by Jenny Lawson (2021)

This is a candid look at anxiety and depression told with wit and humorous anecdotes to remind us that we are not alone with those struggles.
