Yummy Recipes!

Cathy Gipson brought this delicious rhubarb coffee cake recipe to the Spring Meeting. Many people asked for the recipe, so here it is!!!

RHUBARB COFFEE CAKE

2 Cups finely chopped rhubarb. 1 1/2 tsp. Baking powder 1/4 Cup margarine 1/2 c. Milk or orange juice 2/3 Cup sugar 1/2 tsp. Vanilla flavoring 1 Egg 1 tbs. Sugar combined with 1/2 tsp 1/4 tsp. Salt 1 tsp. Cinnamon 1 cup plus 2tbs. Flour Cream together margarine and sugar. Beat

in the egg. Add salt, flour, baking powder, liquid, and vanilla. Beat until smooth. Fold in rhubarb. Spread batter evenly in a greased or sprayed 8 or 9 inch square baking pan. Sprinkle top evenly with sugar/ cinnamon mixture. Bake in preheated 350 degree oven for 45 minutes or until done.

3/4 c. brown sugar

1/3 c. vegetable oil

1/2 tsp. baking soda

1 c. diced rhubarb

1/2 c chopped nuts

1/4 c. brown sugar

1/4 c. chopped nuts

1/2 tsp. ground cinnamon

1/2 c. buttermilk

1 tsp. vanilla

1/2 tsp. salt

Topping

1 egg

Gluten-Free Breakfast Casserole

1lb Bacon 20oz Hashbrowns, thawed 2c Cheese 1/4 Green onions, sliced 12 Eggs 1c Milk 1 Tsp salt and pepper to taste

Directions:

In medium frying pan over medium heat, cook bacon, remove pan from burner. In large mixing bowl, combine hash browns, cheese, and diced green onions. Add bacon. Stir to combine (cheese might melt a little). Pour mixture into a baking dish and spread evenly. In the same mixing bowl, whist eggs with milk and salt and pepper. Pour egg mixture over bacon and hash brown mixture (egg mixture will start to sink in—NO mixing) Bake for 1 hour uncovered or until center is set and edges brown. Remove from oven and let sit for 10-15 minutes before serving. Store leftovers in the fitter for unto 2 days if our prior to prove with parties or foil. Take out the fridge for up to 3 days. If overnight, cover with plastic or foil. Take out of fridge and bring to room temperature before baking.

RHUBARB AND STRAWBERRY JAM

3 cups of chopped rhubarb with a little bit of water

1 cup of sugar

1 box of strawberry Jello

Bring rhubarb to a boil and cook. Add sugar and stir until mixed well. Remove from the heat. Add the Jello then put the mixture into the hot jars and seal with wax.

NUTTY RHUBARB MUFFINS

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. In a small bowl, mix sugar, egg, vanilla, oil and buttermilk. In a medium sized bowl, mix flour, baking soda, and salt. Stir sugar mixture into the flour mixture and 2 cups all-purpose flour blend until evenly moistened. Stir in rhubarb and nuts. Spoon into well greased and floured muffin tins. Stir together the topping ingredients and sprinkle evenly over the top of each muffin. Bake about 20 minutes or until the center springs up when touched. Makes 1 dozen muffins.

CHEESEBURGER CASSEROLE

1 pound hamburger

4 or 5 big potatoes sliced moderately thin

2 cups shredded sharp cheese

1 can cream of chicken or celery soup

After the hamburger is browned, alternate the rest of the ingredients in a baking dish that has been sprayed with olive oil and bake 40 minutes at 400 degrees. Enjoy!!!!

3-4 volunteers are needed. Two to slice and plate desserts (although pre-sliced is appreciated) and 1 person to take money. Take the tote from the HCE Closet at the Extension Office. Inside you should find: serving plates and utensils, carry out containers, tablecloths, signs, a cleaning bucket, cloth and dish soap.

Arrive around 4PM so you have time to set up, slice and plate desserts. The DAV starts serving dinner at 5 PM but people will start buying desserts as soon as you set up. Groups are usually done by 6:30 but it might run later.

Homemade desserts are preferred. Fruit pies, cakes and fluff desserts sell best. If you purchase desserts, please be sure they are good quality.

You are welcome to order food and eat there, the food is good and reasonably priced.
